Where can I get a School Physical?

In addition to our local pediatric practices, many of the area Walgreen Pharmacy and CVS Pharmacy locations offer school physicals in addition to assessment and treatment for illness.

Many of the immediate care facilities in the area offer school physicals in addition to assessment of treatment of illness.

These facilities often have reduced pricing during the months of August and September for school and sports physicals.

Where can I get needed immunizations?

Village of Arlington Heights has an immunization clinic held on the second Monday of the months from 5PM to 7PM. Vaccinations are \$10.00 each for non-insured and underinsured families. Pre-registration is **required**. Call (847) 368-5760 to register.

Cook County Department of Public Health offers free immunizations to qualifying families. Services are offered at the Rolling Meadows Courthouse. Call (847) 818-2860 for information and appointment.

Where can I get the required eye exam for entry into Kindergarten and first-time entry into an Illinois school?

In addition to area eye doctors' offices, you can obtain a qualifying eye examination from area vision centers.

I have a child with special needs. Are there area doctors, eye doctors or dentists that can provide services?

We have many highly qualified practitioners in our area. Please call your School Nurse for assistance. The Nurse can be reached by calling your local school.

I understand the school physicals are returned to parents when they are incomplete. What should I do to insure that the physical exam is complete?

There is a PARENT SECTION that needs to be completed and signed by the parent. It is on the side opposite the immunization record, above the physical examination record.

School code requires *all* sections on the physical exam be completed. Check your physical exam before you leave your health practitioners office. Area that might be missed include: DIABETES SCREENING and LEAD RISK QUESTIONNAIRE.

If your child has a chronic condition, make sure your health care provider indicates the status of the condition as opposed to checking *Normal*.
