Methodology

Public Opinion Strategies is pleased to present the key findings of a telephone survey conducted in Arlington Heights School District 25, Illinois. The survey was completed February 16-21, 2022, among 250 registered voters, with 150 cell phone respondents, and has a margin of error of $\pm 6.2\%$.

Jim Hobart was the principal researcher on this project. Torie Bolger was the project director, and Katie Connolly provided analytical support.








Political

"Would you say that things in Arlington Heights School District 25 are going in the right direction, or have they pretty seriously gotten off on the wrong track?"












The School

Two-thirds of voters would give the district schools an A/B grade.


Soft GOPers and voters who give high marks to the buildings and district's pandemic response are likely to give an A rating.

"Would you say that District 25 schools are better, about the same, or not as good as schools in other parts of the state?"






Younger voters, voters without children in the district, and home renters are unlikely to be able to rate the facilities.

Proposals

The Ballot Measure

"Shall the Board of Education of Arlington Heights" School District Number 25, Cook County, Illinois, improve the sites of, build and equip additions to and alter, repair and equip existing buildings, including, without limitation, building classrooms for full day kindergarten and replacing windows, flooring, roofing, plumbing, electrical equipment and HVAC systems, and issue bonds of said School District to the amount of sixty million dollars for the purpose of paying the costs thereof?"




Voters solidly favor offering full day kindergarten but are more conflicted on the ballot measure.


"Would you favor or oppose District 25 offering full day kindergarten for all district families?"


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Voters across party lines favor offering full day kindergarten and improving the existing buildings.






Older voters are *least* likely to favor offering kindergarten and improving the buildings.




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Dads are the most supportive of offering kindergarten and voting yes on the ballot measure.




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Voters with children attending the district schools are more supportive, but those without are also in favor.






The "Don't Know" voters are a key swing group.




Voters who give the current buildings an A or B rating are more than 2:1 in favor of voting for the measure.





Profile of Initial Favor/Not Yes (27%)










Funding

The tax impact of \$19/month makes no difference for a majority of voters.







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The school district covering all costs associated with full day kindergarten is the top funding choice.

Classroom

Space

Building additional classrooms at the existing elementary schools is narrowly the more popular option.

"Now I would like to read you two options for potentially creating the necessary classroom space for full day kindergarten. After I read each one, please tell me which comes closest to your own opinion."



One option is to build additional classrooms at the district's existing elementary schools. These classrooms would house the full day kindergarten students.



Another option is to build additional classrooms at the district's existing middle schools, and move fifth graders to these new classrooms at the middle schools. The full day kindergarten students would then be housed in the vacated space at the elementary schools.




Don't Know

Regardless of new classroom location preference, a majority are in favor of full day kindergarten/improving facilities.





There is little to no difference between parents and nonparents for building in elementary v. middle schools.





More than 50% of voters agree that full day kindergarten is the best way to prepare children for academic success.






Other people say that full day kindergarten is simply too expensive and that it is not something that local taxpayers should have to pay for, even if other school districts provide it. There are private schools for parents who want to send their children to full day kindergarten.



Voters who say full day kindergarten is too expensive for the district are split on the ballot measure.








This being the wrong time to increase taxes is the more convincing argument against the ballot measure.





Support for the ballot measure jumps a net 10 points on the informed ballot.


"Now that you have heard some more information, would you vote YES or NO on the June 2022 ballot measure?"

The Bottom

Line

THE BOTTOM LINE

A potential referendum that would fund full-day kindergarten in the district starts out in solid shape, but winning a June campaign will require an aggressive turnout effort that maximizes turnout among younger voters, especially parents. An electorate dominated by voters age 65+ would put passing the referendum in jeopardy.

The strength of the messages that we tested also demonstrates that there is an opportunity for a persuasion campaign focused on the benefits of full-day kindergarten. These messages are especially effective with women, Democrats, and voters age 45-54.

The District receives high marks from voters, which is certainly a positive when it comes to passing a referendum. A strong turnout-focused campaign that emphasizes how full-day kindergarten will serve to improve the already strong district will give the referendum the best chance of passing.
