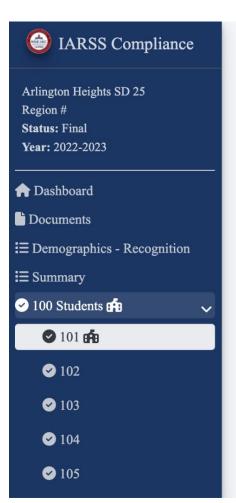

## Annual LEA Determination



Annual Local Education Agency Determinations
Illinois Special Education Accountability and Supports System

States are required to make annual determinations on the performance of each Local Education Agency (LEA) based on indicators identified by the federal government and delineated in the State Performance Plan (SPP). States must include the following components when making annual determinations:

- Performance on compliance indicators (4b, 9, 10, 11, 12, and 13)
- Timely correction of noncompliance
- Single audit findings
- Timely, valid, and reliable data

**2024 Result** Based on this annual review, ISBE has determined that **District 25 Meets Requirements** in implementing one or more of the requirements of IDEA.



## Special Education Audit conducted by NSSEO May 2023



## AHSD25 Special Education Audit Targets and Outcomes

- 1. Family Satisfaction OUTCOME: High level of satisfaction with 81% of responses in agreement or strong agreement with statements describing high quality IEP implementation and inclusive practices.
- 2. Determination of special education eligibility process OUTCOME: AHSD25 eligibility/evaluation practices reflect a consistent, well-defined IEP process.
- 3. Parent involvement in educational placements. OUTCOME: Parent attendance, participation, and associated comments reflect engagement in the process. 85% of respondents reported agreement or strong agreement across multiple indicators of successful family IEP involvement.
- Least Restrictive Environment. OUTCOME: AHSD25 provides a full continuum of special education services with 89.7% 4. D<sub>25</sub> students receiving services in general education classrooms reflecting a commitment to LRE.
- 5. Inclusive practices across all schools. OUTCOME: 69% of Best Practice Indicators of High Quality Inclusion are implemented at a high level, 27% partially implemented and only 4% not yet implemented. These include class locations, AHS school climate, teaching practices, student scheduling, progress monitoring; and family IEP involvement.





## Life Safety Audit



The Regional Office of Education (ROE) conducted their annual health & life safety inspections in October.

Building inspections are conducted of every room in every building with the Facilities Operations Managers (FOMs) and Ryan or Daniel.

- minor compliance items including emergency lighting and illuminated exit signs
- updating certifications on fire extinguishers
- minor electrical safety items
  - closing open junction boxes
  - o installing ground-fault circuit interrupters (GFIs) near sinks
- minor adjustments needed to clear exit pathways
- uncover door vision panels
- verify that required equipment certifications are posted

We are pleased to report that these minimal findings reflect the diligent efforts of our Maintenance and Custodial staff in keeping our buildings safe and reliable for students. Overall, this inspection affirms our commitment to maintaining a safe and reliable learning environment, thanks to the dedicated attention of our facilities team.

## Curriculum Equity Audit



In August 2021, contracted with Public Consulting Group LLC (PCG) to conduct a Curriculum Equity Audit and review of the Library Media Centers (LMCs).

The purpose of the curriculum equity audit in the areas of Reading/ELA and Social Studies is to provide the district with information about the strengths and gaps in the curricular materials focused on supporting diversity and cultural competence.

## The K-8 Curriculum Equity Audit is being conducted in seven phases:

- Phase I. Project Launch
- Phase II. Data and Document Review
- Phase III. K-8 Curriculum Program Review: Interviews and Focus Groups
- Phase IV. K-8 Literacy Program Review: Schoolwide Grades 1 and 4; Heinemann Grade 8
- Phase V. K-8 Social Studies Program Review: TCI Grades 2, 5, and 8
- Phase VI. Library Media Centers (LMCs) Review, Elementary and Middle Schools
- Phase VII. Action Planning (to be completed in collaboration with SD25)
